Pastor's page

During my vacation after Easter, Cindy and I spent 6 of the 7 days putting together a playset with swings, a slide, a climbing wall, and some other things. (Full disclosure: My son in law and daughter helped on Saturday and Sunday). It was a big undertaking with lots of wood, screws, bolts and other items. When we began the process, we were excited to do this for our grandchildren. By Thursday afternoon, as the temperatures rose into the mid 80s, we lost our enthusiasm. Finding the right size bolt or screw amidst the boxes of hardware got to be harder and harder. The ground was not perfectly level, so things didn't align just right. In order to make things fit, heavy pieces of the playset had to be lifted, twisted, or both so it all connected properly. In the midst of it all, I would begin to wonder if attempting this project was such a good idea.

We know the story of the Exodus. After the pass over of the angel of death, the Jews escaped the slavery and abuse of Egypt and headed into the desert. They were on their way to the Promised Land. The journey was hard and uncomfortable. There were times they thought they had made a bad decision following God and Moses into the wilderness.

They complained about the food, the water, the uncertainty, and the leadership of Moses. There were times they declared they wanted to return to Egypt. "Slavery is better than this!" they declared. Even though God presence was demonstrated by the pillar of cloud in the day and a pillar of fire at night, they still doubted Him. They questioned His intentions for them. "Did He bring us out into the desert just to die?"

Sometimes life can be beyond hard. Circumstances, illnesses, difficult relationships, finances, and life in general can put us in a tailspin. There can be times when we, like the Jews in the wilderness, can wonder about God's intentions for us. We can feel pushed to the brink, beaten down, stepped on, and forgotten. When days become difficult, I try to remember the calling of Moses in Exodus 3. From the burning bush God tells Moses, "I have indeed seen the misery of my people in Egypt. I have heard them crying out because of their slave drivers, and I am

concerned about their suffering." When life is beyond difficult and troubles continue to pile up, remember that God is there. He sees our misery and hears our cries. He cares about what we are going through. God is not far off, or distant. Jesus was called "Emmanuel," which means God with us.

I would love to say that our faith in God will guarantee us a life full of sunshine and rainbows. But we both know that is not true. The Israelites did escape the brutal life of slavery, but found themselves in the desert. Hot, tired, hungry, dusty. The journey to the Promised Land can be a difficult one. Challenges, difficulties, and hardships are found on that road. But so is God. God is with us. He has promised that He will never leave us nor forsake us. James 5 reminds us: "... be patient and stand firm, because the Lord's coming is near."


