Grace for the Journey

Genesis 12: 1-2 Now the Lord said to Abram, "Go...to the land that I will show you. I will make of you a great nation, and I will bless you."

. .so, Abram went—but he did not go alone!

Although we church folks seldom consider it, we are a people on an amazing journey. Like Abram and so many other biblical ancestors who followed the Spirit's leading to a new place of promise and hope, each of us is traveling a path God has set before us. Like any journey, our path includes twists and turns, high roads and low places we must learn to navigate.

Most people prefer to have a clear idea of where they are going and how they will get there. When planning a trip, some folks turn to maps, while others look to a GPS to guide them. In our instant, want-it-now American culture, we usually seek the quickest and most direct path.

Most of us join churches that seem to have a clear direction, only to discover sooner or later that the roads we travel by faith rarely are smooth. Every congregation faces times in its life together when a blind turn or an unexpected shift takes it down a

different road. Suddenly the church finds itself in an unfamiliar and uncertain place. This twist in your journey calls your congregation out of its ordinary routine. You have entered an inbetween time, a space in which things may no longer feel familiar and comfortable. Naturally, this in-between time brings with it more than a bit of anxiety.

If your community of faith is in the midst of one of those in-between times right now, have no fear. Rather than living in anxiety, this can be for you a time to celebrate—because you have entered a phase that is expectant with grace. This in-between time can become a sacred space for discovering new life-giving possibilities for your congregation.

Like Abram, every church is called by God—and not just once, but over and over again. Have you ever thought of it that way before? Your church is part of the body of Christ: Its members are called together for a distinctive purpose. That purpose—God's preferred future for you as a faith-filled community—is your communal call. It is God's vision for you.

As circumstances shift over the years, God's call on your congregation may change. As that

call changes over time—and it will—your church will experience times of transition. And over the last several years we have experienced many changes.

Responding to God's call is not always easy or clear. Yet our journey of faith remains just that—a journey, one that is filled with promising in-between times. transitions. Let's pray that God is getting us ready for a new call.


