

Worship ABCs - Part II

During worship on Pentecost (June 8), I began a mini-series on Worship ABCs, discussing the different elements of worship, why we do them, and, maybe, why we do them the way we do them. In June we talked about gathering; the call to worship and hymn of praise; confession, pardon, and Gloria; and song. In July, we've covered the Word and the Sacraments.

Prayer for Illumination & Scripture – As we move through the order of worship, we move into the time of the Word, beginning with a prayer for the Holy Spirit to illumine us, to guide our understanding of the scriptures read and the message



proclaimed. This is then followed by readings from scripture. I try to choose two texts that relate, often the gospel reading for the day and one other. Some pastors read an Old Testament Lesson and a New Testament Lesson. Some add in a Psalm or reading from the New Testament letters. According to the PC(USA)'s *Book of Order*, "The role of the congregation is to listen prayerfully, actively, and attentively to the Word that is read and proclaimed. Such listening requires expectation, concentration, and imagination." ¹

Proclamation – Along with the Prayer for Illumination and reading of Scripture, proclamation or preaching belongs in the subheading of "The Word." For in proclamation, the preacher seeks to expound on, explain, and apply Scripture to our lives, encouraging discipleship, faith, and justice. My task, then, is to boldly declare the good news, the message of Scripture, the Word that is Christ Jesus. In preparation for my sermons, I read the scriptures; I read commentaries and research the text, I pray and ask God to inspire me so that I may bear faithful witness to the good news of God's love and grace. The Notes or Marks of the Reformed church include "the Word of God...truly preached and heard." As with the reading of Scripture, the congregation's role is to listen with attentiveness and prayer. In the *ABCs of Worship*, the author notes that "a sermon is to be an encounter of the listener with the living Lord, the Word of God revealed in Scripture."

Sacraments – In the Presbyterian Church, we recognize two sacraments "as having been instituted by the Lord Jesus Christ through the witness of the Scriptures and sustained through the history of the universal Church," Baptism and Communion, (also called the Lord's Supper or the Eucharist, meaning thanksgiving.)⁴ The sacraments are, according to the *Book of Order*, "the Word of God enacted and sealed in the life of the Church, the body of Christ." Using ordinary elements of water, bread, and fruit of the vine, we proclaim God's love and grace.

Baptism – Through the gift of God's grace in the water, the movement of the Holy Spirit, which unites us with Christ in his death and resurrection, the Sacrament of Baptism demonstrates and affirms an individual's identity as a child of God and initiates them into the family of God, the Church, so that they may grow and live as an engaged disciple and witness to God's love in the world. We baptize both infants

and adults as the sacrament is wholly dependent on God and not on us or our ability to understand or believe. When children *and* adults are baptized, the congregation, on behalf of the church universal, promises to nurture their spiritual growth and to help them grow in a life of faith and discipleship.

As the value and validity of baptism comes from God alone, we believe in one baptism. John Calvin, one of the first voices of the Reformed Tradition, he wrote, "we ought to consider that at whatever time we are baptized, we are washed and purified once for the whole of life. Wherefore, as often as we fall, we must recall the remembrance of our baptism, and thus fortify our minds, so as to feel certain and secure of the remission of sins."

Communion – In the Sacrament of Baptism, we are initiated and welcomed into the family of faith; and in the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper, we join with that family, the communion of saints in every time and place, around the table, for a joyful feast hosted by God. In response to God's grace and love, we gather as the family of God for the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper remembering Jesus' life, death, and resurrection in the breaking of the bread and drinking of the cup and experiencing his presence in our midst by the power of the Holy Spirit so that we might be nourished, fed, equipped, and encouraged to live out our faith in the world.

In the PC(USA), we affirm that Christ is truly present with us in the Sacrament of Communion by the power of the Holy Spirit. Unlike other denominations that see the bread and wine transformed into or joined alongside the body and blood of Christ or those that see communion as purely a remembering, we follow John Calvin and affirm that Jesus is present in the bread and wine, nourishing us in a spiritual way. As the Directory for Worship affirms, "all who come to the table are offered the bread and cup, regardless of their age or understanding" and "even those who doubt may come to the table in order to be assured of God's love and grace in Jesus Christ." God, who is bigger and more complex than all of our imaginings, invites and transforms, welcomes and serves whomever God wills. Our table is open to all.

We'll have more Worship ABCs in August!

In addition to the school supply donations you made in July, we also delivered 6 pounds of canned goods and 10 pounds of milk.



Article One: Purpose
